JUDGES



Taki Sarantakis has been President of the Canada School of Public Service (CSPS) since July 2018, having previously served as Associate Secretary of the Treasury Board at the Treasury Board of Canada Secretariat. Mr. Sarantakis spent most of his career at Infrastructure Canada, including as Assistant Deputy Minister of Policy and Communications. In 2011 Mr. Sarantakis was awarded Canada's Public Service Award of Excellence in Public Policy, and in 2013 he was a recipient of the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal. Prior to joining the federal government, Mr. Sarantakis was a doctoral candidate at the University of Toronto. He holds a B.A. and an M.A. from York University in Toronto, as well as an Executive Certificate in Public Policy from the Harvard Kennedy School of Government. He is a graduate of the Rotman School of

Management's Institute of Corporate Directors Education Program, holding the ICD.D designation.



Ellen Burack Since June 2021, Ellen is program director of the Certificate Program in Regulatory Leadership, a joint initiative of the University of Ottawa and Carleton University. Until her retirement from the federal public service in April 2021 after 31 years, Ellen was assistant deputy minister of the Major Projects Management Office at Natural Resources Canada and had previously been the assistant deputy Minister of Community Safety and Countering Crime at Public Safety Canada. Prior to serving in these positions, Ellen worked for many years in senior executive roles in both transportation and environmental policy and regulation, including at Transport Canada and Environment Canada. Ellen has also held executive positions at the Department of Justice, Public Works and Government Services Canada, Treasury Board Secretariat,

and on Interchange with the Canada Science and Technology Museums Corporation.



Shirley Carruthers is the Assistant Deputy Minister (ADM) of the Corporate Management and Services Sector and Chief Financial Officer (CFO) at Natural Resources Canada. Before being named ADM & CFO in March 2021, she served as Director General and Deputy Chief Financial Officer within the Financial Resource Planning and Management Branch as well as other executive positions at Global Affairs Canada. She has significant experience leading the development and execution of innovative corporate strategies in complex environments. Moreover, she excels at bringing people together from across multiple organizations to address diverse issues and find collaborative solutions. Shirley holds a bachelor of business administration from the University of New Brunswick, and is a Chartered Professional Accountant.



Randall Germain obtained his undergraduate degree in political science and history from the University of Victoria and his doctorate in political science from York University. Prior to joining Carleton University in 2003, he taught at McMaster University, the University of Sheffield, the University of Newcastle upon Tyne and Aberystwyth University. He has convened the International Political Economy Group of the British International Studies Association (1998-2001), and co-edited the Routledge/RIPE Series in Global Political Economy (2000–2007). From 2009-2012 he was chair of the Department of Political Science, and he is currently on the editorial board of *Review of International Political Economy*. His teaching and research interests focus on theoretical debates in IPE, global economic governance and the political economy of global

finance. His current research examines the problem of history in IPE and the challenges of currency internationalization.



Ron Morrow was appointed executive director, supervision, at the Bank of Canada January 3, 2023. In this role, Mr. Morrow is responsible for the supervision of retail payment service providers (PSPs) and the oversight of Financial Market Infrastructures (FMIs). Mr. Morrow first joined the Bank in 1992 and has worked in several different areas across the Bank's monetary policy, financial stability, and funds management functions. In 2010, he became Managing Director of the Funds Management and Banking Department, then Managing Director of the Financial Stability Department in 2013. Mr. Morrow became an Advisor to the Governor in 2018, focusing on advancing the Bank's strategic objectives related to retail payments, financial market infrastructure

issues, and the efficiency of the Canadian financial system. Born in Thunder Bay, Ontario, Mr. Morrow received an honours bachelor of arts degree in economics, with a minor in mathematics, from the University of Waterloo. He also holds a master's degree in economics from Queen's University.



Peter Routledge was appointed Superintendent of Financial Institutions in June 2021, for a seven-year term. He previously served as the President and Chief Executive Officer of Canada Deposit Insurance Corporation (CDIC) beginning in November 2018. Mr. Routledge has extensive experience in Canada's financial sector. Prior to joining CDIC, he was a Senior Advisor at the Department of Finance where he provided advice on a range of policy issues including financial stability, housing finance, and competition in Canadian financial services. He served as managing director of research at National Bank Financial, where he led a team responsible for producing equity, fixed income, and derivatives research on Canadian financial institutions. Prior to that, Mr. Routledge led the Canadian Financial Institutions Group at Moody's Canada, with

responsibilities for covering issuers in the banking, life insurance, personal and commercial insurance and reinsurance industries in Canada and the United States. Mr. Routledge holds an MBA from INSEAD in France, and a bachelor's degree in business and economics from Simon Fraser University.

Eric Champagne PhD, is associate professor in public administration at the School of Political Studies and director of the Centre on Governance at the University of Ottawa. He teaches courses on the theory and practice of public management and governance, public policy development, public administration research methodologies, program evaluation and risk management. He is also an instructor at the Professional Development Institute where he develops and teaches courses for practitioners in the field of public sector management and governance. His current research focuses on infrastructure financing and asset management in the context of multilevel governance (basic infrastructure, transports, water) and on the transformation of the public sector in the aftermath of the pandemic (digitalization, telework, hybrid policies).

Jérôme Bilodeau is the director of the Buildings Division at NRCan's Office of Energy Efficiency, where he oversees the delivery of programs and policies aiming to save energy and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. In addition, Jérôme also teaches Energy Efficiency Policy at Carleton University, and sits on the board of the Canadian International Council (National Capital Branch) and on the Steering Committee of the UN's Global Alliance for Buildings and Construction. Prior to this role, he was Senior Consultant at Dunsky in Montréal, and manager at Environment and Climate Change Canada. A licensed professional engineer, Jérôme holds a B.A.Sc. in Mechanical Engineering from the University of Ottawa, and an MBA from HEC Montréal.



Katherine Leblanc is a proud Acadian with extensive experience in the federal public service. She began her public service career in 2015 as a student at the Department of Crown-Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Canada. She is currently a Senior Program Analyst at Fisheries and Oceans Canada and New Brunswick Federal Youth Network Co-Chair. She participated in the 3rd annual Case Competition in 2014 as a student at the University of Ottawa.



Sharnelle Morgan is a Senior Policy Advisor working in Operations at the Privy Council Office leading the advancement of a number of social policies. Prior to joining PCO she held various policy roles within the Federal Government. Sharnelle is also the co-founder of the Canadian Black Policy Network and Toronto Black Policy Conference, a not for profit organization aimed at creating a safe space for Black community members and allies to explore policy issues affecting Canada's Black communities. Passionate about creating equitable spaces and engaging in public policy, she is recognized as an emerging leader and was selected as a 2021-22 Action Canada Fellow, and recently recognized as 2022 Top 100 Most Powerful Women as a RBC Future Launch Leader. Sharnelle holds a Masters of Public Policy from the University of Toronto's Munk School of Global

Affairs and Public Policy and a Bachelor of Public Affairs and Policy Management from Carleton University.



Anandu Nair is an IT Advisor at Employment and Social Development Canada.
